1 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

- This Act may be cited as the "Save our Allies Con-
- 3 gressional Gold Medal Act".

4 SEC. 2. FINDINGS.

- 5 Congress finds the following:
- 6 (1) The events of August 2021 marked a sig-7 nificant turning point in the history of the United 8 States engagement in Afghanistan, as the Nation 9 underwent a process of withdrawal after over two 10 decades of military presence.
 - (2) Over the course of those 20 years, countless men and women in uniform made tremendous sacrifices to uphold the principles of democracy and freedom, while also honoring the promises made to the Afghan people to build a safer and more prosperous Nation.
 - (3) Among these exceptional individuals were the 13 individuals who participated in the Afghanistan evacuation in 2021, serving as a beacon of hope and demonstrating unwavering dedication to the ideals of America.
 - (4) When the final withdrawal was announced, Chad Robichaux knew he needed to act. His combat interpreter, Aziz, who had saved his life on countless occasions throughout his eight deployments to Afghanistan as part of a Joint Special Operations

1 Task Force, was now being hunted and targeted by 2 the Taliban for helping him. Determined to save his 3 loyal friend, Chad embarked on a mission that would 4 bring together 13 modern-day avengers, all Special 5 Operations veterans, and one determined woman, to 6 drop everything and rescue Aziz and his family from 7 Afghanistan. Without hesitation, each member of the 8 team agreed to join the daring mission. 9

(5) In a matter of hours, Chad Robichaux assembled his team and made a crucial call to Sarah Verardo, the wife of a catastrophically wounded Soldier from his service in Afghanistan, who miraculously secured their way to Hamid Karzai International Airport (HKIA) in Kabul, Afghanistan. The 12-man team quickly mobilized, with Chad heading to Abu Dhabi, UAE, to establish a humanitarian center for evacuees. Meanwhile, Tim Kennedy, Kevin Roarke, Sean Gabler, and Dave Johnson headed for HKIA itself. Setting up a command center at HKIA, the team conducted non-stop rescue operations amidst Taliban-controlled territory, facing immense danger without a Quick Reaction Force (QRF). In just 10 days, their unwavering efforts led to the successful rescue of over 12,000 lives.

1	(6) Even in the face of tremendous adversity,
2	the team's dedication did not waver. Despite Abbey
3	Gate being destroyed and the gates welded shut,
4	they refused to leave. Over the next two months,
5	they continued their humanitarian efforts remotely,
6	leading a coalition to rescue an additional 5,000 in-
7	dividuals through alternate routes around the region.
8	Their commitment and determination made a sig-
9	nificant difference during this critical time of need.
10	(7) Chad Robichaux's mission did not end with
11	the evacuation from HKIA. Teaming up with Fellow
12	Force Recon Marine and Scout Sniper, Staff Ser-
13	geant Dennis Price, he embarked on a grueling 10-
14	day, 90-mile reconnaissance mission along the
15	Tajikistan and Afghanistan border, swimming into
16	Afghanistan every night past Taliban and Chinese
17	soldiers in order to use their special operations expe-
18	rience to build evacuation routes for women and
19	children still trapped in Afghanistan as Afghan
20	Commandos attempted to move them to the
21	Tajikistan border. Braving the treacherous terrain
22	and encounters with foreign militaries, including
23	Chinese, Russian, Tajikistan, and Taliban fighters,
24	they successfully established routes that are still in

1 use today, ensuring more people could find their way 2 to safety. 3 (8) The valor and courage displayed by Chad 4 Robichaux, Sarah Verardo, and the 12 Special Oper-5 ations veterans during the Afghanistan evacuation in 6 2021 exemplify the very essence of America's prom-7 ises to the Afghan people throughout the 20 years 8 of war. Their actions served as a powerful testament 9 to the unwavering loyalty and dedication of the 10 United States Armed Forces, reinforcing our na-11 tion's role as a beacon of hope and justice on the 12 global stage. Their commitment to duty and human-13 ity will forever be etched in the Congressional record 14 as a shining example of American heroism. 15 (9) Under the exceptional leadership of Force Recon Marine Chad Robichaux, this remarkable 16 17 team of Special Operation veterans took up the 18 charge to protect and evacuate over 17,000 citizens 19 and Afghan allies from Taliban-controlled Afghani-20 stan, during a time of unfathomable danger and un-21 certainty. 22 (10) These individuals have dedicated their lives 23 to protecting our country, putting their own lives on 24 the line to safeguard others, and their heroism de-25 serves great honor.

1 SEC. 3. CONGRESSIONAL GOLD MEDALS.

2 (a) Presentation Authorized.—The Speaker of 3 the House of Representatives and the President pro tempore of the Senate shall make appropriate arrangements 4 5 for the presentation, on behalf of the Congress, of a single gold medal of appropriate design to Chad Robichaux, 6 7 Sarah Verardo, Tim Kennedy, Kevin Rourke, Sean 8 Gabler, Dave Johnson, and Dennis Price, in recognition 9 of their exceptional efforts and selfless dedication during the Afghanistan evacuation in 2021, which led to the safe 10 11 evacuation of over 17,000 people from Taliban-controlled 12 Afghanistan. (b) DESIGN AND STRIKING.—For the purposes of the 13 presentation referred to in subsection (a), the Secretary of the Treasury (referred to in this Act as the "Secretary") shall strike the gold medals with suitable emblems, devices, and inscriptions, to be determined by the 17 18 Secretary. 19 (c) Smithsonian Institution.— 20 (1) In general.—Following the award of the 21 gold medal under subsection (a), the gold medal 22 shall be given to the Smithsonian Institution, where it shall be available for display as appropriate and 23 24 made available for research. 25 (2) Sense of congress.—It is the sense of 26 Congress that the Smithsonian Institution should

1 make the gold medal received under paragraph (1) 2 available for display outside of the District of Co-3 lumbia at times, particularly at other locations asso-4 ciated with the team of Special Operation Veterans' 5 service in the Afghanistan evacuation of 2021. SEC. 4. DUPLICATE MEDALS. 6 7 The Secretary may strike and sell duplicates in 8 bronze of the gold medals struck under section 3, at a price sufficient to cover the cost thereof, including labor, 10 materials, dies, use of machinery, and overhead expenses. SEC. 5. STATUS OF MEDALS. 12 (a) National Medals.—Medals struck pursuant to 13 this Act are national medals for purposes of chapter 51 of title 31, United States Code. 14 15 (b) Numismatic Items.—For purposes of sections 5134 and 5136 of title 31, United States Code, all medals 16 17 struck under this Act shall be considered to be numismatic 18 items. 19 SEC. 6. AUTHORITY TO USE FUND AMOUNTS; PROCEEDS OF 20 SALE. (a) AUTHORITY TO USE FUND AMOUNTS.—There is 21 authorized to be charged against the United States Mint 22 23 Public Enterprise Fund such amounts as may be nec-

essary to pay for the costs of the medals struck pursuant

to this Act.

- 1 (b) Proceeds of Sale.—The amounts received
- 2 from the sale of duplicate bronze medals authorized under
- 3 section 3 shall be deposited into the United States Mint
- 4 Public Enterprise Fund.
